

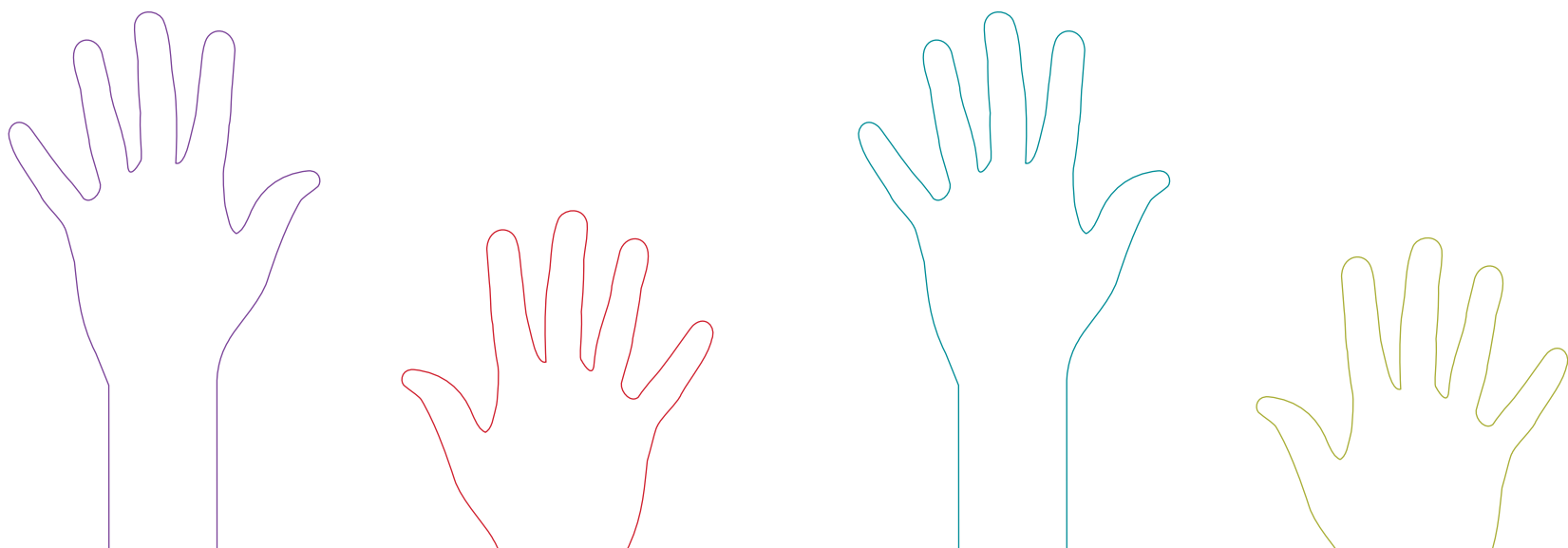

## DID YOU KNOW?

- **Premature birth** is defined as birth before 37 weeks of pregnancy.
- **Moms and babies** in the U.S. are facing an urgent health crisis.
- **Premature birth** and its complications are the largest contributors to infant death in the U.S. and globally.
- **Americans lead the world** in medical research and care, yet the U.S. preterm birth rate is among the worst of highly developed nations.
- **Pregnancy-related death** has more than doubled over the past 25 years.
- **Women of color** are up to 50 percent more likely to give birth prematurely and their children can face a 130 percent higher infant death rate.
- **More than 20 percent of premature babies** are born to black women – that's 1 in 5 babies.
- In this country, black women have maternal death rates over three times higher than women of other ethnicities.
- **1 in 10 babies is born prematurely** in the United States every year, costing American businesses \$12 billion annually in extra health care costs.
- **We fund scientific research** at our Prematurity Research Centers to improve the health of moms and babies.

# Politics makes fundraising complex

**IT IS STANDARD FARE** for Rhode Island to have ballot measures that involve public expenditures for broad social goals, be it affordable housing, or this year, environmental projects and school infrastructure. And whether people think about it or not, all those ballot measures are eventually repaid through taxes, a reality in Rhode Island that means the state had more than \$10.5 billion in accumulated debt in 2016, according to a state report.

How does that connect to philanthropy in the state? Well, the bigger the tax bite, the less money individuals and corporations have to give to those worthy causes they have chosen



to support through the years. To complicate matters further, the national political scene threw a wild card into the mix with the passage of tax reform last year. Local nonprofits are not sure if the change in the standard deduction will limit how much individuals give to charity, but many are uneasy about what the future will bring, even as they are cautiously optimistic that people give not for the tax deduction but because they believe the cause is good. Still, in today's strident political climate, nonprofits find that charting the correct course to maximize their fundraising efforts can be a challenge. One person's worthy cause could be another's political red zone. Nonprofit leaders and their development staffs must

make clear that the action they support is very much focused on the mission of the organization and not something that can be hijacked by one side of the political spectrum or the other. If they are not successful, it could have real consequences. As always, the answer lies with the public, which must vet the worthy causes deserving of support, knowing that the need remains great, no matter the political climate.

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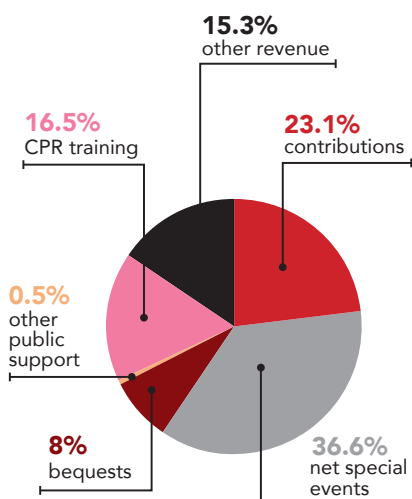

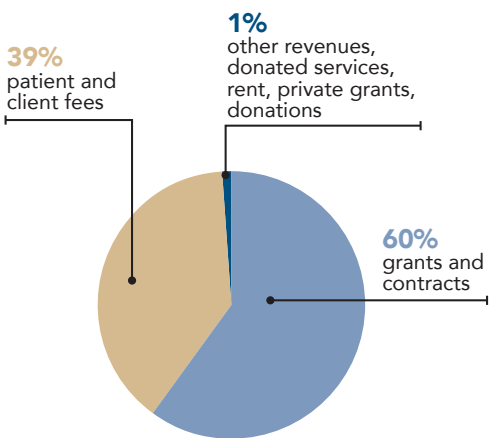

# For nonprofits, less is more on political advocacy

**RHODE** Island nonprofits, to varying degrees, have thrown their weight behind certain causes in past elections that align with their missions.

But some have learned the hard way that there are risks in political advocacy for organizations that rely on fundraising and public support.

According to the Internal Revenue Service, "All section 501(c)(3) organizations are absolutely prohibited from directly or indirectly participating in, or intervening in, any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to, any candidate for elective public office."

Monetary, verbal and written contributions to political campaigns are also prohibited, and may result in revocation of an organization's tax-exempt status.

But the more than 8,511 nonprofits operating in the state are allowed to participate in voter-registration drives and efforts to educate the public on certain causes under consideration during an election.

A ballot measure, also known as a referendum, acts as a gauge of voters' opinions on everything from casino operations to levying bonds to pay for public school infrastructure repairs and state constitutional amendments.

**Crossroads Rhode Island** President and CEO Karen A. Santilli acknowledged prior leadership of the nonprofit publicly committed themselves to certain political opinions between 2011 and 2012. She declined to discuss the specific issues but said fallout was immediate. The agency reported a temporary dip in donations in late 2011 following then-President Anne Nolan's support for pension reform.

"People got angry with Crossroads because we were taking a side on a particular issue – right or wrong – [and] they felt it wasn't relevant to our mission," she said.

Santilli said Crossroads tracked a roughly 12 percent decrease in direct-mail revenue from the period during which these individuals' opinions became known.

Characterizing the donors whose patronage was lost during that time as "lower-dollar ... but consistent, regular annual supporters," Santilli said the result was "a direct negative impact on our revenue."

"That's not something we can afford," she added.

The key to future election-related education efforts for Crossroads, and any nonprofit, said Santilli, is "to remember who your stakeholders are and where they stand on an issue."

It's likely, she added, Crossroads will be politically active in local or national elections again, especially when it comes to affordable housing, homeless services and domestic violence – all of which tie directly to its mission.

Future involvement, she said, must have a "direct and relevant impact on our work."

Jonathan Stone has led **Save The Bay** for a decade and said its political activity is minimal.

The Providence-based nonprofit's main political agenda, he said, is "helping educate the public about the merits of particular referenda" relevant to Save The Bay's mission.

Examples of previous involvement include programming regarding public funding for open-space allocation at Warwick's Rocky Point Park, Fort Adams in Newport and India Point Park in Providence in the run up to the 2010 election. And more recently, Question No. 3 on next month's statewide ballot regarding clean water and the green economy is supported by Save The Bay. The nonprofit has produced educational materials supporting the ballot question, which seeks \$47.3 million for 10



environmental projects.

Stone isn't interested in expanding the organization's political activities. Calling Save The Bay a "very issues-driven" nonprofit, he added: "We are parsimonious in our desire to get involved. We want to be sure [political issues] are aligned with our own mission" before supporting them.

When it comes to political action by nonprofits, a little goes a long way, he says.

"When running a nonprofit, you dilute your own ability to influence outcomes when weighing in all the time," he said. "Over time, you undermine your ability to [make an impact]."

Rachel Flum, executive director of Providence-based **Economic Progress Institute**, agrees selectivity is paramount.

"Our credibility lies in our ability to analyze state budgets and other data from a nonpartisan perspective," said Flum. "Engaging in elections would sway that."

As for other tax-exempt groups, she said, involvement in election-focused public education depends on each organization's mission.

Once a nonprofit does get involved, she says, the key is to make all educational and informational resources universally available to candidates and the public.

"Nonprofits and other advocacy organizations certainly have expertise, and it's important to share the expertise with candidates," said Flum, noting the institute hosted a gubernatorial forum in 2014 to do just that. ■

hands at fundraising know the top three things that draw donors and their donations to a cause.

"Animals, then kids, then veterans are usually the top three that get people to open their wallets," said Dee DeQuattro, founder and communications and development director for **Operation Stand Down Rhode Island**.

OSDRI's mission is to help veterans secure stable housing and employment, as well as other assistance, according to individual needs, including case management, basic human needs, referrals, and education and training services. OSDRI is Rhode Island's largest veteran-service provider, helping more than 2,000 veterans a year. OSDRI is headquartered in Johnston, with one-stop service centers in Johnston, West Warwick and Newport.

About one-third of OSDRI's budget, \$750,000, is the result of fundraising, DeQuattro said. Federal grants account for \$1.1 million, she said. The nonprofit has also benefitted from an endowment established at the **Rhode Island Foundation** in 2016.

The fundraising slice is a crucial part of the budget, she said, because it isn't attached to conditions that can tie their hands in special

circumstances.

"It's huge because that's how we can help a veteran who doesn't necessarily meet the conditions of a government grant," DeQuattro said.

The majority of employees at OSDRI are paid from grant funding, DeQuattro said, while most of the donation funding goes toward services for veterans.

"Fundraising is never an easy job," she said. The \$750,000 OSDRI receives in fundraising

each year comes from many small fundraisers, organized by business owners and people interested in supporting OSDRI's cause.

"They can see the impact we've had on the community," DeQuattro said of the organization's work to aid veterans that began in 1992.

Some of the more-lucrative fundraisers OSDRI has relied on include the Gold Star Gala in May at **Twin River Casino** in Lincoln, which raised \$75,000, and a \$15,000 steak fry. Proactive donors are always welcome on the OSDRI website, [osdri.org/donate](http://osdri.org/donate), as well.

DeQuattro said OSDRI has experienced some recent competition from national veterans programs, which often seek out the same donors and fundraising organizers that have long supported OSDRI.

"It's not an overly huge state where you need 17 different service providers," DeQuattro said.

Since 2013, Dan Evangelista has been running the **Rhode Island Military Organization** lounge, a respite for members of the military and their families at **T.F. Green Airport**.

The lounge's main expense is for snacks and beverages for the tens of thousands of active and retired members of the military from across New England who travel through T.F. Green each year. Volunteers man the lounge in three four-hour shifts per day, including Evangelista.

Supplying the foodstuffs requires a budget of about \$1,000 per week. "It doesn't cost too much because you get donations for food," Evangelista said.

In a given day, about 300 servicemen and servicewomen and their families could stop in to rest in the lounge and relax while waiting for their flight. While they're there, they can help themselves to soda, snacks and Keurig-brewed coffee. But that's not Evangelista's favorite part of the lounge.

"It's more the storytelling," he said.

The lounge does well in fundraising, usually through small, privately run fundraisers and private donations. In March, the **South County Rod & Gun Club** hosted a fundraiser for the lounge, donating \$1,200 to the cause. "Little things like that are very helpful," Evangelista

said.

In the past, the Rhode Island Military Organization has organized cigar dinners to raise funds for the lounge, "But those were a lot of work," he said. Mostly, RIMO relies on the timely, if unorganized, kindness of others to keep the lounge stocked, and on the hospitality of the **R.I. Airport Corp.** for the space at the airport.

"It always seems to work out," Evangelista said. Prospective donors are welcome to help in that regard with a phone call at 401-691-2365.

**Dare to Dream Ranch**, a 501c3 nonprofit offering alternative therapy programs for service members, veterans and their families with post-traumatic stress disorder, anxiety, depression, military sexual trauma or mild traumatic brain injury, runs on about \$67,000 in fundraising each year, said Karen Dalton, founder and president.

The organization offers veterans equine therapy, woodworking, fly-tying/fishing, gardening, resume writing, career coaching and more. It offers the services for free, and while the organization is run entirely by volunteers, it still struggles to fund its programs.

"So, we're continually fundraising," Dalton said.

She said she'd like to get the organization's fundraising to about \$120,000 per year to fund paid positions for people, so the organization doesn't have to rely so much on volunteers, whose contributions are subject to the ups and downs of their shifting free time.

"Where if it's a paid position, then we'd have a lot more availability," Dalton said.

Interested donors can contribute through the website, [dareto-dreamranch.org/donate](http://dareto-dreamranch.org/donate). Hopefully, Dalton said, Dare to Dream will grow its fundraising soon, though competition for donors' attention and generosity is fierce.

"It becomes a bit of a challenge. We have a lot of veterans nonprofits in Rhode Island," she said. ■

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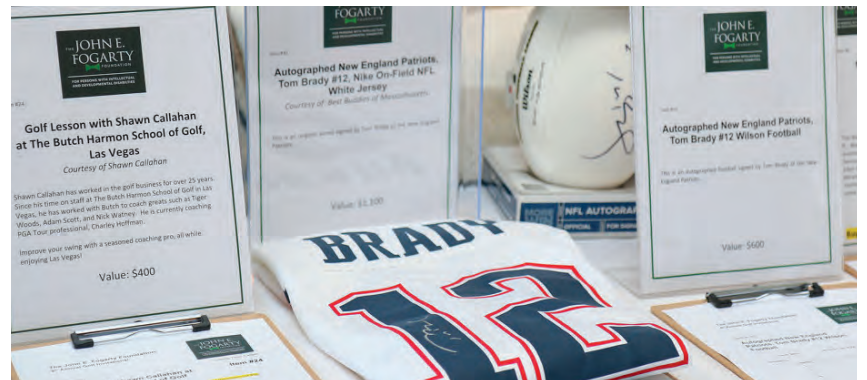

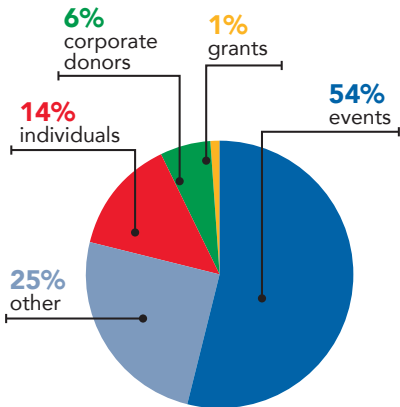

# UWRI's Anthony Maione is retiring after 13 years with 'no regrets' managing challenging fundraising landscape

*(Editor's note: This is a condensed version of a story that was originally published in the June 15 print edition. The United Way in June appointed Cortney Nicolato to succeed Maione as president and CEO.)*

**FOR** 15 years at the **United Way of Rhode Island**, Anthony Maione has sought to better the lives of Rhode Islanders and improve their communities.

As CEO since 2005, he has distinguished the local branch of the national social-services nonprofit group via its 2-1-1 call and walk-in volume and the recent launch of MyFund, to name a few accomplishments.

"In the United Way system, there are apples and oranges, and we're a walnut," he said laughing, noting how UWRI seeks to meet people's needs using a broader set of community-engagement tools than other branches.

Much of his work, he said, has not been choosing the best programming from a list of mediocre options but deciding between "good, better and best."

But philanthropy, added Maione, who will retire Dec. 31, "is changing. You have things now that you didn't have before and a lot of that has to do with technology and social media.

"The one thing you learn doing fundraising as long as I've been doing it," he said, "is that it's the donor's money [and] you have to pay attention to what they want."

**What were your goals when you were hired by UWRI?**

United Ways all over the country at that time were moving to ... try to be more relevant, produce better results from grants and

be more public with those results.

When I came in, I read my mission as two things: relevancy and emotion. United Way in the workplace is a transactional thing. We would show up once a year and ask people to make gifts. They would do that and then they wouldn't see us again for a year. We really needed to put [ourselves] out there more and there were two things we did out of the gate [when I came onboard].

First, we moved ... to Olneyville – a community we wanted to be in and in which we thought we could be helpful.

The second thing made an even bigger difference – we opened 2-1-1. Now, 2-1-1 takes close to 200,000 telephone calls each year. It is the most per capita of any 2-1-1 in the country, a significant force in the lives of people and hits both [relevancy and emotion]. ... We see

2,000 walk-in visitors per year ... no other 2-1-1 does this.

**With 2-1-1, were there initial hurdles you had to get over or was the volume always that high?**

One of the early challenges was that you have to get all of the phone companies to recognize 2-1-1 is a number. There is 2-1-1 all over the country ... and you have to be careful because if you're on the border of Massachusetts, you might get them ... or [vice versa]. ... [But] it grew really fast.

There had been a small help line, which had been a United Way [asset] a long time ago and it ended up at **Crossroads Rhode Island**. They were doing a fine job, but it was small and didn't have the resources. When we [renewed ownership of] 2-1-1, we had resources: money to promote it, money to hire more staff and we knew it would be part of our strategy going forward.

**You've talked about 2-1-1 and being feet-on-the-ground in areas that need it most. Are those the top priorities for United Way?**

We have a number of high priorities. We have a summer-learning program. ... We can show average gains of 15 percent in math and reading. In some communities, [especially] if they're lower-income communities, it might be as high as 50 percent in reading and 75 percent in math. We're not just holding the kids stable, which is what we had hoped to do; we're pushing them forward.

One of the top needs is always housing. We are way low in affordable housing and it affects more than those who might become homeless. It affects the workforce, young people who might want to stay here after college [and] families.

We've been very active in the issue ... [investing] \$100,000 in three bond issues – something very unusual for a United Way. ... We don't think bonding is the best way to do this forever; it's one part of the solution. The next thing for us to think about, [similar to] Massachusetts and Connecticut, is an annual budget allocation for affordable housing. Rhode Island is not going to grow economically, you're not going to locate a business here if employees don't have a place to live.

**In a 2012 PBN interview, you characterized Rhode Island philanthropy as having "bright spots ... but still challenging times." A year later, you said the era was the "toughest fundraising climate in [your] career." Have we moved on philanthropically from the slump of the Great Recession?**

We're still coming back ... and are probably still down \$800,000 or \$900,000 from what we used to raise in 2009.

Philanthropy is changing. You have things now that you didn't have before and a lot of that has to do with technology and social media. Now, if you have money to give, you could go to a GoFundMe page. The one thing you learn doing fundraising as long as I've been doing it, is that it's the donor's money [and] you have to pay attention to what they want. If the donor wants to do GoFundMe, and there are a lot of really wonderful causes on there ... they can and that's different from how things used to be.

We're doing a lot more volunteerism ... [something] important to millennials ... [who were] taught how to volunteer, but there was never a discussion about giving. The thought was, your gift is your time. Millennials will give, we think they are very generous, but they want to kick the bricks [too], they want to be involved – that's different and we have to accommodate for that. We're not going to ask them to change the way they think, it's all about the donor.

**You were talking about a flexibility in meeting people where they want to give. Is MyFund the result of that thinking?**

Yes. We've had a donor-advised fund since the 1980s, called the Philanthropy Account, where people would give us \$1,000, get one tax receipt and throughout the year designate their money. We decided this doesn't work anymore. ... It's all about the fewest number of clicks. [Giving] needs to feel more like your online banking experience.

Now, you give us \$1,000 and on your phone you can see your balance, who you've given to throughout the year, decide if you want to give again, add money [and] ... it's free to the donor.

We set a goal of raising \$260,000 on 260 new

donors. We thought that was a pretty assertive goal [and] we're at roughly 115 donors and have raised north of \$500,000. We got a \$500,000 donation from one anonymous donor to push the total above [roughly \$1 million].

**In January, UWRI took over Serve Rhode Island. Has it helped to have this asset?**

We used to be the Volunteer Center of Rhode Island, which became Serve Rhode Island. ... It's a second thing pushed out, which has now come back in – like 2-1-1.

Organizations pay a small fee to list [volunteer opportunities] on the website, then volunteers go on the website and match themselves. There are 66 agencies listed with 250 leads and 12,000 registered volunteers.

I can see, down the road, if not already, there will be pressure about staffing [Serve Rhode

Island] ... and engaging 12,000 people. ... It's awesome, [but] it's a lot more work.

**The two major sources from which UWRI gets its money are corporations and private individuals/groups. What characteristics or profile [metrics] would you give these groups?**

They're more alike than not alike. ... [But] our challenge is never a one-size-fits-all dating profile.

Corporations, like people, have certain causes they care about. When a new company comes to Rhode Island, we check their website to see if they are aligned with the things we do. If not, it's not necessarily an opportunity for us. We try not to get mission drift chasing the newest thing in town.

I'm hard-pressed to tell you the name of a large company that isn't doing something around volunteerism and marrying it to the cause they care most about.

That's not that different from a person sitting at home asking, "What do I care about?"

[However], it's a lot easier on the corporate side, where we probably have a conversation with [each firm] once per year or more.

**Do you think the volume of nonprofits in operation today, especially in Rhode Island, has created a competitive funding atmosphere?**

It's a very competitive environment. I've been doing this for 35 years and it has always been. You never turned up in Rhode Island saying, "This will be easy."

Now, your competition is even bigger because of GoFundMe and Kickstarter.

For a while we had a merger and consolidation fund and gave grants to nonprofits, [which] merged or consolidated their back-room activities. [Therein], we learned the nonprofit community isn't like the corporate community, where if the two balance sheets work and we can save some money, we'll do it. People come to this work because they feel something, and if the organization is going to go through a merger, those [emotions] have to be addressed.

We did it for six years, and there were plenty that consolidated but it wasn't enough to keep it going.

**Eight staff members were cut in 2009 to accommodate a dip in revenue. Today, where does the organization stand financially and employment-wise?**

[Regarding the \$12.8 million annual campaign], we've been in that zone for the last five or six years and we see that as good because we were in a fall before. ... We dipped and are level [now]. As I indicated, from 2009 we are about \$900,000 less. But you have to level before you can go up. The interesting thing about relevancy is that a lot of the money we lost during the recession was money that was passing through. ... The money that was given to us tended to stick and, to me, that is encouraging because it meant the things we were doing – the 2-1-1, bond issues, children's summer programming – were important enough to donors that even in the recession they stuck with us.

**Are you excited to retire?**

I anticipate continuing to be involved in the community, but not at the full-time level. I would like to be doing something for the next five years before I totally hang up my sneakers.

**Is there anything to which you wish you had put more time?**

The Dalai Lama says, "If we've done the best we can, we shouldn't have any regrets." I have no regrets looking back and I try not to have too much worry looking forward. ■

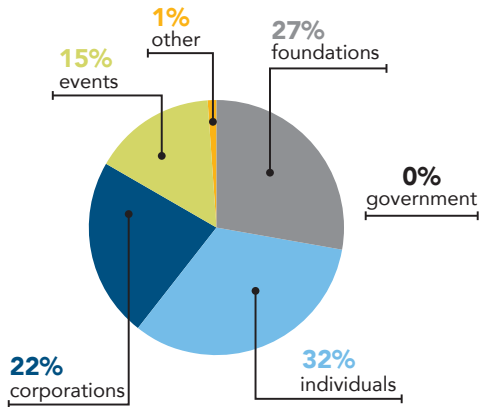

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# Proving value key to preserving donations

**THE** new federal tax law implemented this year – with a doubling of the standard deduction amount allowed for individuals and married couples – has left some nonprofits wary of fourth-quarter giving, despite some encouraging signs.

The National Council of Nonprofits in January called the tax law, which removed a financial incentive for giving, “devastating to the millions of people around the country who rely on charitable nonprofits for everything from food and shelter ... to a safe place to escape domestic abuse, and enrichment through the arts.”

Before, when making a charitable contribution, you could itemize instead of taking a standard deduction. But the 2017 federal tax overhaul championed by President Donald Trump and congressional Republicans changed that: The deduction for donations stays the same – but it needs to be itemized to be claimed.

“Overall, what we were looking at was the world of the unknown,” said Cortney Nicolato, president and CEO of **United Way of Rhode Island**. “CEOs in the nonprofit sector have been working with the Association of Fundraising Professionals, looking to The Chronicle of Philanthropy, talking and figuring it out.”

So far this year, the United Way is seeing an increase in giving, she said. It operates 2-1-1 – a help resource line – works to alleviate homelessness, connect folks with free tax preparation and quality child care, among other efforts.

But Nancy Wolanski, director of the **Grantmakers Council of Rhode Island**, calls the tax situation alarming. She cites national forecasts that overall giving will drop. She also notes that reductions in government resources spur demand for nonprofits.

“Republican leaders have already cited the size of the deficit as justification for further cuts in social services, which would compound both the need in our local communities, as well as further reduce the funding available to provide essential

services,” she said.

Chris Barnett, senior communications and marketing officer of the **Rhode Island Foundation** in Providence, said it’s too soon to tell what effects the new rules will have on giving.

“We actually don’t have any conclusive evidence, either from our own experience this year or from grantees or nonprofit fund holders,” he said. “We won’t have a good sense of the impact until after the fourth quarter ends.”

Laura Calenda, chief marketing and philanthropy officer at homelessness organization **Crossroads Rhode Island**, agrees that it’s too soon to tell; she’s hopeful, though, about holiday contributions.

“We believe that the majority of our donors give to Crossroads because they want to help people who are experiencing homelessness, not be-

cause of a tax write-off,” she said.

And the news isn’t all bad from other organizations, though all agree that the fourth quarter is key. **Children’s Friend**, also based in Providence, reports holding steady, with giving slightly increased over last year so far.

“We have not seen an impact,” said President David Caprio. “We’re eagerly waiting and watching.”

His organization served more than 36,000 individuals with low incomes with services such as education, advocacy and connections with other community programs last year. Its major fundraising walk this past spring brought in a bit more money than the year before, Caprio said.

Nicolato said United Way’s advantage is its strong relationships with corporate donors.

Corporate giving is projected to increase, said Nicolato, with companies working to ensure their giving reflects what they are saving in corporate taxes.

“They are giving more in a different way,” she said of corporations. Since the tax-law change, many have still committed to keep donations at the same level, with a strong local commitment.

Though nonprofits have had longstanding efforts underway to educate donors and the community about what they do, how they do it and the impact on the community, those things are even more of a focus now, said Caprio and Nicolato. And different approaches likely come into play.

For example, money certainly isn’t the only way to give to a nonprofit. United Way makes it clear that donors can give noncash gifts such as stock options and land.

Raising a nonprofit’s profile through community actions or outreach is another approach that may bring in new contributors or keep existing donors.

This past spring, **Children’s Friend** did a lot of communications work focused on the state budget, giving its mission momentum.

“We believe that child welfare is underfunded,” Caprio said. “What this [advocacy work] allows us to do is to tie our message together, show there is a need out there. We show the need and show how they can help.”

Nonprofits have to continue to show their value, said Nicolato.

“We have to show ‘your dollar did this,’ ” she said. “My guess is that this [new law] will elevate that need.” ■

**1 October marks the 150th anniversary of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Providence, which is the oldest continually operating club in the country. How has the local organization's work evolved?**

The challenges [facing] today's youth of Providence are far greater than in the past. More than 80 percent of the kids we serve are considered to be [living] in poverty and many of them rely on us to provide meals, which was not a primary focus [of the organization]. The biggest evolution has been our shift from recreation to a deeper focus on education. ... We're teaching youth the skills they need to rise out of poverty.

**2 You have been serving on the club's board for 15 years, including the last nine as president. What has kept you involved?**

For me, investing in our youth and putting them on a path to succeed yields amazing results as they move forward. ... The satisfaction of seeing these kids get into college or learn the life skills they'll carry with them through adulthood is extremely rewarding.

**3 What activities does the club have planned to celebrate the milestone anniversary?**

Over the summer, we hosted block parties at our South Side and Fox Point clubhouses to celebrate our work in the community – with the community. We also expanded our swim lessons

program.

Through all of this, we hope to reconnect with alumni we've lost touch with through a special website, [www.bgc150.com](http://www.bgc150.com), [which] they can visit and identify themselves.

On Nov. 29, we will hold our Denim Diamonds Gala at Café Nuovo.

**4 How can the community get involved with the organization's work to ensure the club remains a resource for children for another 150 years?**

Community is at the heart of everything we do, and our alumni are truly our best ambassadors for connecting others with our work and members.

We also have volunteer opportunities, such as providing tutoring help and serving meals at one of our clubhouses.

And ... people can invest in the future of a child ... by giving to a range of different programs and initiatives.

**5 What one piece of advice would you give to people who are still on the fence about volunteering?**

My advice to anyone on the fence about volunteering is to visit an organization that serves Providence's youth.

Your volunteerism can be a catalyst for positive change, and I truly believe that we all have something to offer in making a difference for others. ■

# 5Q: Tyler Young

Co-owner, Young Family Farm

(Editor's note: This is a condensed version of a story that was originally published online Aug. 3.)



It's OK to think creatively. Donations don't need to be money.

**1 In almost 12 years, the Young Family Farm has donated the equivalent of more than 1.1 million meals to the Rhode Island Community Food Bank. Why do you prioritize such philanthropy so highly?**

Farmers don't have a lot of money in the bank and so to give back, we work with food. You hear about the number of children in need of food in Rhode Island, 1 in 5 children having only one meal or less a day. ... When a society features people who support one another, we all benefit.

**2 What types of produce are most common in your donations to the food bank?**

Potatoes are the crop we harvest the most. Our farm, which began with a strawberry stand in 1997, now features 100 acres of potatoes. In addition to donating the culls, or seconds, we give a lot of turnips and winter squash. We start working with the food bank in September and they pick up six pallets of produce at a time.

**3 Farming is an age-old profession, but how do you stay relevant with the advent of new technology and crop breeds?**

The profession is constantly evolving, whether it's technology or people's diets. My grandfather never ate kale a day in his life and now everyone wants it. And you look at the chemistries used by farmers now and they've become so much safer

and so much more environmentally friendly. Toxicity levels aren't there.

The technologies are unbelievable. A lot of the computers we use are on tractors, equipment and sprayers. They're accurate; there's no waste. ... In addition, there has been a food movement, which has progressed to a more plant- and protein-based diet.

**4 What is your advice to other farms or manufacturers who may have the ability to donate, as your family and farm do, but have not yet made the plunge?**

It's OK to think creatively. Donations don't need to be money. At Young Family Farm, we donate our seconds, excess or slightly flawed produce. It's fresh, delicious and healthy produce we don't want to see go to waste. Giving back is good citizenship and good business.

**5 What is the highest hurdle for agriculture in the 21st century?**

There's a lot of concern regarding too much regulation of agriculture. ... It seems like you can't laugh, sneeze or cry without doing something wrong. I truly believe that this type of over-regulation ... is going to make our food system more insecure. When you over-regulate a small-margin business, you chance putting them out of business. ■
